

# EDUCATIONAL MEDIA RECOMMENDATIONS

Choosing the right media for your child can be overwhelming! Thankfully there are many safe, enjoyable, and educational options.

[PBS Kids](#) has a lot of great content on their site, and they have various free apps that feature their favorite PBS characters. Parents can also access tips and character-based activities for their kids through the parent portion at [PBS.org/parents](https://pbs.org/parents).

[Noggin](#), designed by Nick Jr., offers a subscription-based app full of games, shows, and activities for little ones and a subscription-based channel through Amazon.

[Go Noodle](#) is a site/app with curated educational videos, games, and activities for little ones to enjoy. While some videos are informative, others will get your kiddo moving!

[Khan Academy Kids](#) is an app that focuses specifically on younger kids. It's 100% free and provides activities in the core early learning subjects (math, reading, writing, language, and social-emotional skills).

[IXL](#) offers math and language arts materials for preschoolers. You can practice ten free questions per subject per day, or you can opt to pay for a monthly subscription that gives you unlimited access and allows you to track your child's progress.

[ABCmouse](#) is a subscription-based educational app that allows your children to learn math, reading, and science through gameplay.

[Your Local Library](#) may have online videos or ebooks that your child can enjoy, and they may also have storytimes and activities you can attend for your preschooler. Your librarian can also help direct you to educational media available in person for you to borrow.
